Long waited spring has finally come to Japan with a full bloom of "Sakura" or Cherry Blossom. Sakura was in full bloom in the week of 25 March in Tokyo. Since Japanese archipelago stretches from north to south, the timing of

Airports in Cambodia

Cambodia, officially the Kingdom of Cambodia, is a country in Southeast Asia that borders Thailand to the west

and northwest, Laos to the north and Vietnam to the east and southeast. In the south it faces the Gulf of Thailand. Phnom Penh is the capital and largest city. Siem Reap, a city located near the Angkor Archeological Site, listed on the UNESCO World Heritage List, is the gateway to the Angkor region, and is Cambodia's main destination for tourism. Battambang, the largest city in western Cambodia, is known for its rice production and Sihanoukville, a coastal city, is the primary sea port and resort destination.



There are sixteen IATA registered airports in Cambodia. There

are three international airports; Phnom Penh International Airport (PNH), Siem Reap International Airport (REP), and Sihanouk International Airport (KOS). Out of three airports, Phnom Penh International Airport (PNH) and Siem Reap International Airport (REP) are registered as Level 3 airport by IATA.

Phnom Penh International Airport (PNH)

Phnom Penh International Airport (IATA: PNH, ICAO: VDPP) is the busiest airport in terms of passenger movements and currently the largest airport in Cambodia spanning over a land area of 400ha. It is located 10km west of Phnom Penh, the nation's capital city.





Airport Infrastructure



The airport is at an elevation of 12m above mean sea level. It has one runway designated 05/23 with an asphalt surface measuring 3,000m by 50m. It was resurfaced and renovated in 2018.

Passenger Terminal

The airport has two terminal buildings – one for international and one for domestic operations. In 2002, it added a new facility for VIP services. The terminal has 4 aerobridges commissioned in 2003. 3 more aerobridges were added during the passenger terminal expansion fully completed in 2017. The airport's design capacity, with further extension of the current facilities, would be over 10+ million people per year.









Future Developments

Cambodia Airports, the company that develops and manages the Kingdom's three international airports, is carrying out the update of the master plans to accommodate their future growth.

Regarding Phnom Penh International Airport, the objective is to prepare the next extension of the passenger terminal. In the meantime, works for the apron refurbishment has started: By mid-2019, the airport will add a total of 15 aircraft stands.

Also, studies are underway for the building of a new cargo terminal as the last few years have witnessed the significant growth of fret activities. In 2019, two new air-bridges will replace the ones that equipped the airport since 2000. In 2020, there will be 2 additional ones for Code E aircraft.

Siem Reap International Airport (REP)

Siem Reap International Airport (IATA: REP, ICAO: VDSR) serves Siem Reap, a popular tourist destination nearby the Angkor Temples. In 2018, for the second year in a row, the number of passengers has lagged behind Phnom Penh International Airport, which has overtaken the Siem Reap platform as the busiest airport in Cambodia. The growth totaled 6.4% for 4.4 million passengers.

An extension and renovation of the international terminal was complete and commissioned in early 2016. Plans are underway aiming at significantly increasing the runway capacity.





Airport Infrastructure



The airport is at an elevation of 18m above mean sea level. It has one runway designated 05/23 with a concrete surface measuring 2,550m by 45m.

Starting in 2019, major projects include: The full reconfiguration of the domestic terminal, especially its extension, and a new taxiway to increase capacity in terms of aircraft movement. For the first time in Cambodia, the airport will be equipped with 9 check-in kiosks and 2 self-baggage drops.

Air Traffic Control is provided by CATS (Cambodia Air Traffic Services), with full approach and aerodrome VHF facilities being housed in the control tower, between the fire station and the domestic terminal. Area control is provided from CATS Centre in Phnom Penh (Pochentong).
